Examination of Speech



Part A: Dysarthria

Listen for:

- Rhythm
 - Slurring (facial weakness/cerebellar)
 - Scanning equal emphasis on all syllables
 - Speed (slow in cerebellar)
 - Volume (↓ in cerebellar/EP)
 - Monotonous speech (EP)
 - Pronunciation
 - Difficulty with consonants (Pseudobulbar)
 - urgling/nasal sound (Bulbar palsy/neuromuscular weakness)

Pronunciation:

- Yellow lorry tests LINGUAL sounds
- Peter Piper picked a pepper

 to test LABIAL sound
- Bulbar or Pseudobulbar palsy (spastic speech)

Count to 30 to assess muscle fatigue (NMJ)

Cough & say 'Aaaah'

• Lack of palatal movement (Bulbar palsy)

Part B: Dysphasia

Listen for:

- Fluency
 - Non-fluent/broken (abnormal word order) Expressive
 - Fluent Receptive
 - Appropriateness of content
 - Paraphasias (Receptive)
 Neologisms (Receptive)
 - Jargon dyphasia (Receptive)

Identify a common object (Nominal dysphasia)

Repeat a simple sentence (Conductive/Receptive)

Perform a three-stage command (Receptive) N.B. Avoid visual clues.

Read aloud a sentence (Dyslexia – Receptive)

Write a sentence (Dysgraphia – Expressive)

Part C: Dysphonia

Listen for hoarseness/huskiness
